- 1. That noise something makes when you finally get it unstuck. Boot in mud example. Making strudels example.
- 2. Intractability of sin. "in" (not) tractare (manageable); intractable = unmanageable.
 - a. The more we try to manage, the more we sin. Goal example. Romans 6:16-17. John 8:34. Psalm 51:3-5.
 - i. Faith, indwelling of Holy Spirit, conformity to God's will = accepting grace as a gift (scandalous).
 - ii. We will not cling to God until all other options are exhausted, i.e., and impossible situation. Matthew 19:24-26.
 - b. Sin of others. Psalm 25:15-22. Who are the real enemies?
 - c. Brokenness of creation. Romans 8:21-22.
- 3. What's intractable in our text? (Broad to narrow) power differences, death of infants, Moses in the Nile. Yet, what does God do?
- 4. Notes on the text.
 - a. Exodus 2:2 = tōv. Connecting Moses with God's creative work, but God continuing His creative work is not His saving work. Connection between redemption and creation.
 - b. 2:3. Moses is put into an "ark," a term only used here and in the Genesis account of Noah and the flood. What is the connection?
- 5. Jonah 2. What's intractable about this situation? Vv. 3 and 7. How does God draw Jonah up?
- 6. Matthew 14:22-33. What's intractable about this situation? How does Jesus draw Peter up?
- 7. In what ways do we make our situations worse when we try to make them better?
- 8. Why are we so intent on managing our lives?
