8.	God creates ex nihlo, that is "out of nothing." Where are some places in Scripture where we see this? Genesis 12:1-3. Genesis 45:9.
9.	Read Romans 6:4, 7, and John 3:3-5. Where is God making something new in these verses?
10	Luther had this to say about Jesus' Baptism, "[Christ] accepted [baptism] from John for the reason that he was entering into our stead, indeed, our person, that is, becoming a sinner for us, taking upon himself the sins which he had not committed, and wiping them out and drowning them in his holy

baptism."

- 11. The gifts from God through Christ in holy Baptism are forgiveness, life, and salvation. We too are re-born in Baptism with silver spoons in our mouth!
