- c. Expectations of convenience and our struggle with delayed gratification.
- 3. "Those also serve who stand and wait." Read Lamentations 3:25-26. Waiting is usually presented in Scripture as a good thing. Why?
 - a. Waiting is passive and thus reflects and testifies to God's love for us in Christ. Patience: Romans 2:3-4. Endurance: Hebrews 12:1-3. Submission: 1 Peter 2:21-24. Dependence: John 5:17-20. Contentment: Luke 22:42.

- b. Waiting is withholding our works and relying on God's work for us. Proverbs 20:22 and Isaiah 33:2.
- c. Waiting reflects hope and expectancy. Psalm 130:5, Isaiah 49:22-23, and Micah 7:7.
- d. Waiting is eschatological and points to the last day. 2 Peter 3:13-15 and Titus 2:11-14.
- e. Waiting for God is virtual picture of the whole life of faith.
- 4. Jairus waited for Jesus and his daughter died. When Jesus said she was sleeping (v. 39), they laughed at Him Read John 5:19-30. How does Jesus' raising of Jairus' daughter help us to wait?
