h. What does it mean to transform our imagination? Look up Genesis 6:5. Where do you think the King James Version places the word imagination in this verse?

Gene Edward Veith writes, "Our knowledge of God must come from his revelation of himself to us, that is, through his Word, which may in no way be replaced by human reason, emotion, will, or imagination. Imagination is indeed the source of all idolatry (the "graven images" that begin with mental images) and all false religions (which we imaginatively construct to evade the true God)" (*Imagination Redeemed*, 16). How can our imagination betray us or be used to God's glory?

- 3. Read again verse 10 and then read Ephesians 3:14-21. Based on these verses, what strength do we have for the battle? We'll make a list on the marker board.
- 4. What kind of warfare are we engaged in according to verses 11-12? Read excerpt N.T. Wright. Read 1 Peter 5:6-11.
- 5. Read verses 13-17. We will list the six pieces of armor God has provided for us. I will assign one piece to each table, and that table will identify a specific way we might use it today.
 - a. Which piece of armor is difficult for you to utilize and why?
 - b. How can you learn to actively "take up" that weapon?
- 6. In what way is the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God, an offensive weapon in contrast to the other defensive weapons?
- 7. In verse 13, St. Paul urges us to "Stand your ground." This is a military term meaning to "to take over," "to hold a watch post," or "to hold out in a critical position on a battlefield." What sorts of things would cause soldiers to break formation? What's the impact? How does the church contribute to our understanding of St. Paul's analogy of soldiers? What sorts of things make us (and others) want to break formation?
