Holy Gospel Luke 14:1–14

¹One Sabbath, when [Jesus] went to dine at the house of a ruler of the Pharisees, they were watching him carefully. ²And behold, there was a man before him who had dropsy. ³And Jesus responded to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath, or not?" ⁴But they remained silent. Then he took him and healed him and sent him away. ⁵And he said to them, "Which of you, having a son or an ox that has fallen into a well on a Sabbath day, will not immediately pull him out?" ⁶And they could not reply to these things.

7Now he told a parable to those who were invited, when he noticed how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, 8"When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, lest someone more distinguished than you be invited by him, 9and he who invited you both will come and say to you, 'Give your place to this person,' and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place. 10But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. 11For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

12He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. 13But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, 14and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

Not On My Watch

Luke 14:1 One Sabbath, when he went to dine at the house of a ruler of the Pharisees, they were watching him carefully.

At this point, Jesus has already healed twice on the Sabbath. We can see why the Pharisees are watching him. I imagine they are thinking, "Not on my watch." You won't break the sabbath and make a mockery of our faith in our presence, in our home, on the sabbath.

Of course, Jesus isn't interested in appearances, and he isn't interested in how these Pharisees will judge him. He has already pointed out their hypocrisy in their unwillingness to help on the sabbath. What's even worse we see the hypocrisy in their teachings because they won't help people on the sabbath, but they will struggle and fight for positions of honor at the table to help themselves, to improve their standing among men.

Jesus sees this man with dropsy. We think it might mean edema or possibly a stroke. The flesh in that area droops and doesn't work. Jesus chooses the lowest position at the table. He knows what will happen if he disobeys their rules of the sabbath. But he also knows the suffering of this man. So, he chooses, like he always does, to be the lowest. Here the lowest at the table, in life, He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. (Isaiah 53:3) And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." (Luke 9:58) And in death, Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. 5 But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. (Isaiah 53:4-5) But I am a worm and not a man, scorned by mankind and despised by the people. 7 All who see me mock me; they make mouths at me; they wag their heads; 8 "He trusts in the Lord: let him deliver him; let him rescue him, for he delights in him!" (Psalm 22:6-7) I would have you imagine the heart of Jesus and his compassion. He doesn't care about the judgement of the world or the pharisees. I imagine that phrase works as well for the Pharisees as it does for Jesus, "Not on my watch." Not when I am here. Not when I am close. Not when there are lessons to be taught. This man won't go away as he came, "Not on my watch."

Football is about to begin again. I only bring it up because I am an avid Vikings fan. I am excited about the team this year. I am sure they will find a way to let me down. A private sin that I am ashamed of is often things come up on Sunday afternoon. Good things. Important things. Prayer services. Visitations. Communion Calls. Hospital visits. Youth Group. And in the back of my head, my selfish head. I am thinking. I could be at home watching what I want. I could be doing what I want. I don't want to be here or out there serving the Lord. I want to be at home serving myself.

In our reading, the Pharisees inner thoughts betray their actions and vice versa. They scramble to be at the top and no one wants to be at the bottom. They ignore this man and his suffering to laugh and fraternize with important people. Their eyes, their watch is trained on themselves. And the sad part is this story starts with their eyes on Jesus and yet they can't truly see him.

I heard a great story the other day about one of the most important men in all of Christendom. Mordecai Ham was leading a tent revival meeting. The tent was very full. Two young boys about the age of 14 walk up and are interested and want to go inside but there are no seats. Now you might have

that passing thought, "do I want two 14-year-old boys going into the tent and making a ruckus for all the well-meaning adults?"

It didn't matter, the boys decided they wouldn't be able to find seats, so they started walking away. An usher thought to himself, "Not on my watch." He went and got the boys and found seats for them up front for Mordecai's preaching. It changed the boy's life. After that meeting, they dedicated their life to preaching the Gospel. The boys' names, Billy Graham and Grady Wilson. Of course, you know Billy, but Grady was very important as well. He was a member of Billy's inner circle and instrumental in planning his large revival meetings and was a big part of the success of that Gospel preaching. One of the most important men in all of Christendom in nameless. We still don't know who he was, but he wouldn't let the rules, the niceties of society, he wouldn't let the perceived worth of the people dictate how much he would help. He probably only had one thought, "Not on my watch."

I think the lesson is clear. We can be like the pharisees, jockeying for position and importance in the world. We can spend our lives only serving ourselves and doing what we want. The place at the front. The place without struggles. The place free of sick people. The place free of broken people. The place free of homeless people. The place free of alcoholics and drug addicts. The place free from sinners, derelicts and over all annoying and depraved individuals. We can choose seats of honor. Or.

We can listen to Jesus and choose a seat of humility. A seat among scoffers, sinners, broken people. A place filled with people in misery, suffering, and burden.

We can look at all the need in the world, in our community, in our church and say that it is not my problem or we can say, "Not on my watch."

And our joy will be that; in those low and humble places we will find grace and strength. We cannot do these works alone my friends. We can not serve or make our world a littler saltier and lighter without Christ and without the Holy Spirit. And there amongst the sick, the lame, the mute, the deaf, the gambler, the drunk, the homeless, the dying; amongst the least there Christ will be. It shouldn't surprise us because this is where he found us. Suffering and dying. He came down and dwelled amongst the lowly to save them like you and me. Being humble doesn't make us better. Our works don't make us better. Being humble leads us to the lowest place where Jesus is saving the world and it is he who saves us. Thanks be to God that as he sat in heavenly splendor above, he looked down at the suffering of his creation he chose to act, he chose to come down and save us. As he saw all that suffering and guilt, shame, and destruction perhaps, he even said, "Not on my watch."
